#### Learning How to Grow Orchids in Your Environment

This months meeting will feature three round table discussions, led by POS members with experience in the above environments. Feel free to join the discussion group you are most interested in and ask questions and share your ideas and experience with fellow POS members.

#### Growing Orchids Indoors Discussion Leaders, Mike Drilling and Martha Skalak.

Topics to be discussed: windowsills, wardian cases, lighting, humidity control, types of orchids that do well under these conditions.





#### Get to know your 2010 Board and officers!

We started this off with a biography from Todd in the January newsletter. I am including a short bio from Todd this month just to keep every thing tidy.

**President C. Todd Kennedy** is a third-generation grower of orchids in the Bay Area. He served as Vice-President of POS in 2000 and President in 2001. He has chaired judging of POS Annual Show since 2005 and served as chair of American Orchid Society judging at San Francisco 2005-2008.

**Vice President Mary Gerritsen** became totally addicted to orchids about 13 years ago when I attended my first orchid show. It happened to be the 50th anniversary of the Peninsula Orchid Society, and the plants and show were so amazing, I wanted more. I had been growing orchids on and off since college, but mostly things like OSH cymbidium and the Trader Joes (or equivalent) Phalaenopsis no namei. I still remember the first POS meeting that I came to. I was handed a strip of opportunity tickets, won two orchids, and well, it was all over. For several years I attended every show I could, bought all kinds of orchids, covered my kitchen table, the bathroom, and every window in my house with them. But, with time (and money spent) comes wisdom (at least some).

Fast forward to today. Two greenhouses, three lath houses, orchids on my windowsills, my bathrooms, my office. Yep, I would say the orchid bug was still there, and then some. Today I grow lots of miniatures in my cool greenhouse, bulbophyllums, monopodials and dendrobiums in my intermediate house, and a few (well, about 40) cymbidiums here and there around my yard. I am trying hard to be more selective in what I buy, and to trim my collection down to the plants I really want to grow. I am afraid to count the number of orchids I have, and I am not sure I really want to know that number!

This is my third stint as the VP of the POS...you might ask why? I like this job. The VP is responsible for inviting the speakers and skill sessions for the year, and it is a great way to meet other people who love orchids, and to make lasting friendships that can take you to many places, near and far. Over the last few years I have had the chance to visit greenhouses all over California and parts of Australia and Asia, a great way to learn how the best growers do it! I have had the opportunity to meet orchid experts and explorers from all over the world, and many of them have been speakers at the POS. Some of the notable guest speakers we have had include, Leonid Averyanov on the slipper orchids of Vietnam, Lou Jost, Ivan Portilla, Eduardo Sanchez from Ecuador, Eric Christenson speaking on orchids of Peru, and Walter Teague on his orchid adventures, Marni Turkel on Orchids of the US. I have made it a mission to visit as many of the rich orchid habitats before they are gone forever, and thus far have been an orchid tourist in Ecuador, Peru, Costa Rica, Panama, Mexico, Germany, France, Luxembourg, Australia and Borneo. I have many more locations I want to visit and orchids are a great excuse to do so. So if you want to learn more about orchids, and to meet people who know a lot about orchids, consider volunteering to be the next VP of the POS!

**Treasurer Trudy Hadler** has been growing orchids for over 30 years. As a member of four local societies, she has served on the boards of all four, from president to director and every position in between. Trudy is both an AOS and CSA judge.

Cymbidiums are the most prevalent orchids in Trudy's collection, but she has other cool growing genera. Most of her orchids are grown outside in her yard or on her porch. In her 'spare' time Trudy is a volunteer worker at Top Hat Orchids, a nursery in Richmond, where cymbidiums are the major product.

**Recording Secretary Rebecca Grubbs** is also a member of the Refreshments committee. She has been growing orchids for the past 5 years indoors and under a covered patio. Because she lives in Half Moon Bay, cool growing orchids have become her favorite. Rebecca has been a member of POS for 5 years and works for Mills High School in Millbrae.

**Corresponding Secretary Judy Evans** became interested in orchids about 10 years ago when Clint (her husband) brought home two large containers of cymbidiums from his father. She quickly took a class on repotting at Rod McLellan's and a week later had 15 pots (3 bulbs each) of cymbidiums. Over the years they slowly added to their collection while waiting for the repotted cymbidiums to flower. In the meantime they

owned a children's clothing store for 22 years, which kept Judy very busy. They sold the store 3 years ago. On a Sunday in January, 3 years ago, they where driving down El Camino in Redwood City and spotted the sign for the POS show. They decided to check it out. They ran into an old friend from 4-H, Mike Rector, and he invited them to come to a meeting. They did, joined POS, and have been trying to learn as much as they can about orchids since then. Now that they are both retired this is something they enjoy doing together.

Membership Chairperson Janusz Warszawski. For Janusz, growing orchids, is probably the culmination of his general love of gardening. He grew up as a "city boy" without any opportunity for The opportunity presented itself when he got his own front and back yard to play with. He gardening. slowly learned Peninsula weather, microclimates and the fact that here one can grow flowers in every season. That naturally lead to container gardening in order to move flowering plants into display position. Next came discovery of cymbidiums (at POS shows in Palo Alto Town and Country Village) as the "ideal plant" for container gardening, with long lasting flowers in winter -spring season. With cymbidiums came the identification of Orchids, and the possibility to move to a new level of gardening sophistication. All that was done as a weekend and evening relaxation hobby, after long days spent in the very intensive and dynamic disk drive industry in Silicon Valley. With the recent retirement, he has more time to dedicate to his hobbies and to join POS and GCCG, in order to improve his understanding of orchid culture. In winter he grows his indoor orchids under lights, on a large corner widow that can accommodate 12 trays with 70 orchids (with 10-12 blooming and displayed). During warmer seasons these orchids grow outdoors under a shade cloth. He also has close to 200 cymbidiums and other orchids that can grow outdoors year around. His favorite orchids are the ones that will bloom year after year under his growing conditions, preferably with showy color flowers and fragrant, if possible. At the same time he is always open to experimenting with new types and upgrading his collection.

Ways and Means Chairperson Randall Takemoto-Hambleton seems to be traveling.

**Past President Ken Jacobsen** was first introduced to orchids by his uncle in the 1960's and has been growing Cymbidiums himself for over 35 years. Over time, he has added the Odontoglossum alliance plants and several other genera. Since his wife Amy joined in his orchid addiction, they now also raise Cattleyas and Laelias, Lycastes, Encyclias, Vandas, and Masdevallias. Together they even have a few Disas! Their collection now numbers about 2700 Cymbidiums, and about another 2500 of the other genera. Ken is a judge in the AOS judging program, and heads the CSA judging program. He has written many articles for the CSA Journal.

**Director at Large Daniel Williamson** As the son of a career diplomat, I grew up in Europe and on the East Coast. After attending college at Valparaiso University in Indiana, I worked in software development in Chicago for five years. I earned a Masters in International Business Studies from University of South Carolina, and was fortunate to spend eight months in Paris working mergers and acquisitions in a French bank and polishing my fluency in French and German. My future wife's medical training took us to Baltimore in 2000. I started growing orchids when I started taking care of of my wife's languishing plants while she completed her residency. She had three strange scrawny plants among the ficus trees and geraniums. I was able to coax the first blooms from a pink Home Depot dendrobium after nearly a year. That first taste of success led me to the greenhouses of Kensington Orchids, outside of Washington DC. I bought several naively chosen, much loved plants in the fall of 2002

as Kensington closed down. I found the Maryland Orchid Society in Baltimore shortly afterwards. With my wife's support, I transformed our basement in Baltimore into a light and humidity controlled attempt at an indoor greenhouse, and accumulated over 100 plants.

After eight years as a novice grower and exhibitor with the Maryland Orchid Society, we moved to Mountain View in the summer of 2008, unfortunately leaving most of my collection behind. I have been a stay at home dad taking care of my two kids, Aaron (4 ½) and Helen (1), and rebuilding my now small collection. Of the 12 plants I moved across the country, I kept two of the originals and two from Kensington. I grow about 40 plants, mostly Cattleya and Paphs, under lights in my dining room and I am still lerning how to

adjust my growing methods to the bright, dry conditions of our micro-climate. Almost all of my plants have sunburn. My life now revolves around growing orchids and children, not necessarily in that order, in our new California home.

**Director at Large Paul Reeve** comes from a family of botanists. He began to acquire orchids in Berkeley, Mostly from J Carbone and from Warren's Nursery in 1961. Only one of those plants survives, after others were lost variously to fire, freezes, ducks, drowning, etc over the years. He began to acquire more plants in the 1990s from Chick Ebarra of San Mateo, Rod McC, & the other usual sources. He joined POS at his wife's urging 9 or 10 years ago, when she was tired of his abusing his plants and those from his mother's little greenhouse. Now Paul grows too many plants in his house, too many around his house outdoors, and too many in his tiny greenhouse that is appended to his garage. Yet he continues to acquire more flasks and mature plants of the Americas, North, Central, and South! Go figure.

**Director at Large Sharon Langan** has been a member of the POS for 7 or 8 years now. She likes to have flowers in her work area and one day picked up a Phal., which seemed a bit expensive at the time, but was still blooming and beautiful 3 months later! Her interest piqued, she saw one of the signs for our annual show and stopped in, became enchanted, and joined the POS shortly thereafter. "Will never forget the wonder of my first bus trip to Scott Dallas' warren of greenhouses in South City - was totally hooked." She grows in her home and on a covered patio - particularly likes Phrags but also grows some angraecums, miltonias and other genera.

**Newsletter Editor Chaunie Langland** has been producing the newsletter since January 2008, when she took over from Rene Biggs. Rene did this job for 13 years! Chaunie came to the 199? POS show at her mother-in-law's invitation and was instantly assimilated into the POS via the force of the members' cheerful personalities and enthusiasm for orchids. Her orchid collection hoovers around 200 plants. She now has a 6'x8 ' greenhouse, in her backyard in Fremont, as well as a modest Wardian case in her family room. The greenhouse is too small - much too small. Her main focus is Phragmipediums, and recently Neofinetias, Restrepias, and species Phalaenopsis. But, she is willing to try to grow almost anything. When she acquires new orchids she researches them immediately on the internet. She is currently looking for an actual paying job, but until one appears she loves invitations to visit your orchid collection so she can put some photos in the newsletter.

**Snail Mail Coordinator Jackie Becker**: I have been drawn to orchids for a long time but only recently have done something about it i.e., made time in my schedule to come to POS. I had joined POS years ago and remember a great and very helpful potting session by Weegie at her place. But I never made time to come to meetings and eventually dropped out. Also I was discouraged by the bad freeze that year that killed the few Cymbidiums I had acquired from a neighbor. But now I have more outdoor thermometers and I watch the weather reports more closely. I have orchids on a southeast facing porch (mostly Cymbidiums), in a large Southeast window (I bloomed a BLC in the full sun there but it got a bit of sunburn too), and in three north windows. Over my kitchen sink I have hanging plants on sticks or bark. In summer I can hold them under the faucet daily, less often in winter. My computer orchid file says I have 215 orchids but I know that 52 of those are deceased. I just have not learned how to transfer database files from my healthy plants file to my deceased plants file. One of our speakers once said "you have to have killed at least 1000 orchids..." I am working on it. Being in POS is really helping me to learn.

**Webmaster Fred Cox** is a long time software engineer who grew nothing until about 10 years ago, when Cordelia Wong left four hybrid Phals on his kitchen table. Remembering to water them every 1 to 4 weeks was enough to rebloom them, so he took more interest. His office near a north facing facing wall of glass became full of Phals and Paphs and a wonder to his coworkers. Shortly after Fred and Cordelia started going to the POS meetings, he volunteered to revive the stagnant website, and has been running it ever since, with much help from Cordelia.

#### **Editor's Corner**

We had a successful show and I learned even more than usual this year. Because I was in charge of the seminars, I was able to attend a portion of each presentation.

<u>Saturday</u> started off with Gerardus holding a Plant Doctor session. I was having trouble with aphids on orchids in my house and asked Gerardus what to do. I was expecting the answer I got - use Bayer Rose and Flower spray. However, I learned that you should spray it on the leaves and that it is a systemic, as well as killing insects on contact. It was good to get a better understanding of how it works.

**Weegie** had a great handout and she discussed her potting mixes. Then, after repotting a cymbidium right in front of us, she grabbed the plant and pulled plant and pot up off the table to show that the plant was secure in it's pot. I had not seen this done before, though it was not new to some members of the audience, and I would not expect to pull that feat off with my own work.

**Amy** shared her secret potting mix for certain plants with us also, and explained how a dehumidifier can make all the difference in your unheated greenhouse during the winter months, along with removal of your shade cloth.

**Tom Perlite,** of **Golden Gate Orchids,** talked about how important it is to repot when the plant is actively growing, showed repotting in redwood mulch, bark mix, and sphagnum moss. An eye-opener for me was when he showed how the removal of the short protective leaves on Miltonias and Odontoglossums allow the roots to grow down into the potting mix instead of up.

<u>Sunday</u> started off with Mark Pendleton, from Brookside Orchids, demonstrating repotting cymbidiums. Mark discussed the value of our time and recommended that we consider just starting over with a new plant if we have let our cymbidiums reach the point of overcrowding where the backbulbs in the center have started to mound upwards, as repotting a plant like that can take several hours. Another option is to take your plants in to Brookside to have them repotted.

**Dennis (D&D Flowers)** gave a talk on general orchid culture and answered many questions from the audience. (Hmmm, seems like I missed most of Dennis's talk.)

**Tom Mudge** talked about growing orchids outside. He showed the new and popular anti-freezing cloth and discussed using small incandescent Christmas light strings under the cloth to help raise the temperature a degree or two in very cold weather. Don't use LED lights - the reason they use so little energy is because they do not convert electricity to heat, while incandescent bulbs actually convert most of the electricity they use to heat.

Sometimes I wonder, it is truly necessary that I explore every possible mistake that can be made when trying something new? This winter some of my orchids have been plagued with aphids after being brought into the house. I have resisted using insecticides, but this year the aphids were completely out of control. Mealy bugs have been relentless also.

About a year and a half ago I purchased some Rose & Flower spray while at a garden center. Having heard it recommended by Gerardus during one or more of his talks over the years, and also by other experts in our society, I bought it when I saw it, wanting to have it on hand in case of need.

I certainly did not want to bring any pests to the show! One of my entries had two aphids on it the Friday of the show (I brought my show plants in Thursday to start preparing them). And another one had a mealy bug! So, I hauled out the previously unused Rose & Flower and sprayed the flowers and leaves of all four plants going to the show. As it turned out, two of the orchids' flowers did not appreciate this treatment and degraded to very poor condition at the show. Not a stellar debut in the intermediate division! So, after hearing Gerardus talk at the show, I decided I should only have sprayed the leaves. After the show, I sprayed my other plants in the house, the ones that were actually heavily infested with aphids. What I noticed several days later is that the aphids seemed to have enjoyed their bath. They were robust and their communities were thriving. After all I had heard, I was very disappointed with the results. I took another look at the pesticide bottle. Well, finally I noticed the my bottle did not say **Bayer** on it! The rest of the name was the same, but I had bought the wrong brand and it was not the same at all. Off to the store again.


